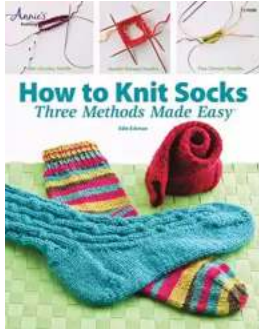

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Next, insert the needle into the first stitch, making sure to keep the loop in the center of the stitches. Knit the round by working your way around the stitches, pulling the loop through as you go. Repeat this process until the desired length is achieved.
