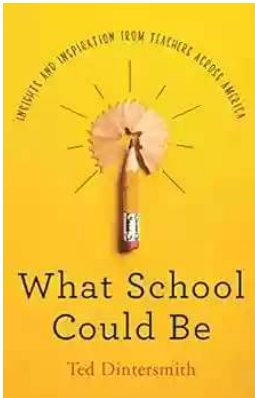

While teaching can be incredibly rewarding, it is not without its challenges.

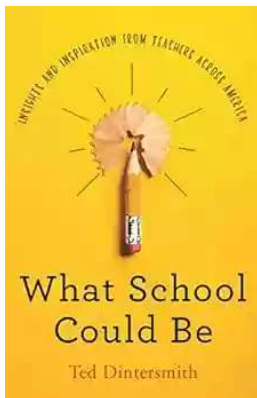
